


All around the globe, an important and a milestone of an examination, the IGCSEs have been cancelled for students the world over. IGCSE stands for the International General Certificate of Secondary Education, and is an academically rigorous, internationally recognised and specialised English Language curriculum which is offered to students to prepare them for the International Baccalaureate and CIE A-level. But why has it been cancelled?

Well, it's not all that hard to understand: The current COVID-19 situation erupting all over the world involves a lot of uncertainties with regards to its cure and recovery. The pandemic has struck almost all countries around the world and has forced numerous schools (including <u>elc</u>) and colleges to shut down. Without joint preparatory efforts from both the teachers and the students, the exam is hard to crack, which is likely to impact their results. Moreover, given the spike in the number of COVID-19 cases thus far, our battle with the virus seems to be far from over, therefore colliding with the prospective IGCSE exam schedule. Thus, it is evident that this cancellation was inevitable.

...Our priority is to protect the safety and well-being of our students and teachers, ensure fairness for all our students and support them in continuing with their education. Today, therefore, we have taken the difficult decision not to run our international examinations in the May/June 2020 series in any country."

Ms. Kothai, our Principal, has sent out a formal email on behalf of the school to all related parents regarding the cancellation of the IGCSE exams, and has also stated that the Cambridge board will be guiding schools on how to counterbalance the cancellation of this exam.

Yes, this cancellation could have an adverse effect on some students; nevertheless, students are encouraged to be resilient as Maya Angelou rightly quotes, "I can be changed by what happens to me, but I refuse to be reduced by it.".



The IGCSE board has directed all countries outside of the United Kingdom to cancel the exam, creating pandemonium among students all over the world. The Cambridge board supported their decision by stating,

"In recent days, many more countries have decided to extend school closures into May and June, making it impossible for many of our schools to hold examinations... We have been consulting closely with our global community of schools, who need as much certainty as possible at an uncertain time... (cont.)

Coronavirus? More like Corona Chaos. Everywhere.

The virus that has killed more than 3400 people and left more than 100,000 in suffering is taking over the world.



In the past few months, China has been hit hard by the emergence of a new type of Coronavirus, which has, in fact, wreaked havoc throughout the world, resulting in a mounting death toll of over 32,000 and a further 686,000 in treatment. It has crashed stock markets, closed down schools, and most importantly, endangered all 7.7 billion people and their souls. So what exactly is this "coronavirus"?

According to the WHO, Coronaviruses (CoV) are a






large family of **viruses** that cause illnesses ranging from the common cold to more severe diseases such as Middle East Respiratory Syndrome (**MERS-CoV**) and Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (**SARS-CoV**). A novel coronavirus (**nCoV**) is a new strain that has not been previously identified in humans. This new coronavirus is named **COVID-19** and originated in **Wuhan**, **Hubei** and was traced back to a **Huanan** seafood wholesale market selling live bats, civet rats, peacocks, and snakes. No, this isn't some fancy pet store but a market that sold these animals for **consumption**. These are eaten as delicacies throughout the whole of China and are sold illegally despite the **ban** on the trade of these animals set by the Chinese government.

So what are its impacts on the population of China? Well, based on statistical data, 3,004 of the total 3400 deaths and 80,559 of the 100,000 infected people are citizens of China alone. The Coronavirus struck at an unfortunate time as the Lunar New Year supervised the movement of a huge population from all over the world into China for the festive holidays, and the risk of the spread of the virus Consequently, mobility has been restricted in Hubei, the epicentre of the outbreak being locked down immediately, prohibiting citizens to leave or enter the province. In a nutshell, both internal and external population movement has reduced significantly in China. Another finding that is quite surprising is that the younger population has suffered fewer deaths compared to older populations. *(Source B).*

During an interview with the Assistant Director-General of the WHO Dr.Bruce Aylward to clear the fog on why exactly is there such a difference in the number of deaths of the younger and elderly age group. This is what he had to say:

"The elderly are dying of an inflammatory process in their lungs due to the coronavirus, and they have a weak immune response. On the other hand, there are many possibilities as to why children are not being affected, one of the most likely is that they get infected but have a low expression of disease. Why? The receptors of the virus bind to the lungs that aren't very mature in children, hence they are unable to develop" iTutorGroup, where one can communicate with other students online *(Source C)*. These are all attempts to prevent people from entering crowded areas where there may be higher risks of the transmission of the virus.


But we should mention that there are a few positive impacts on industries as well, as China's government has become much more transparent through social media platforms such as WeChat and Weibo, both of which has played an important role in reflecting public opinion during the outbreak, prompting the Chinese government to respond and adjust policies accordingly. The outbreak has accelerated the application of new technologies as well. Social communication has been greatly diversified, making room for efficient and online measures of interaction. This trying time is also shaping the entrepreneurship of the private sector. Many businesses have been driven not only by profits but also a desire to provide a social good.

The effects that the Coronavirus has had on economies and industries both inside and outside of China is nothing measly. One of the negative impacts it has had is on the transportation industry; after the public found out that the Coronavirus transmits from one person to another by droplets (mucus, saliva, tears), many have stopped commuting to areas such as malls, restaurants, and recreational spots using public transport. As a precaution, numerous schools throughout China have been shut down, giving rise to online learning software such as turbulence is very evident in the stock market records throughout the world, not just China (*Source D*).

Medical industries inflated overnight to meet the increased demand for sanitizers, masks and medicines. In fact, exorbitant demand of these supplies in many countries (including Malaysia) has imbued the government to to call into effect laws prohibiting the excessive cost of these products, including masks. Automobile and aviation industries are suffering as well, not only due to the fall in consumer demand but also a drop in the functioning of their manufacturing plants as their employees prefer staying at home to minimise the chances of incurring the dreadful disease. There are many key takeaways for the whole world from this entire episode of the Coronavirus chaos; offline-driven businesses have to begin to shift online, especially in education, entertainment, and retail; smart cities have to be made to systematically enhance public management by integrating traffic, emergency and disaster warning; and social media is changing the world, whether it through setting hygiene guidelines, formulating legal measure or creating massive public awareness about serious health

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issues and the importance of quarantine.

As of now, the miracle we can hope for is the invention of a corona vaccine, but it (if we are lucky) would only be available earliest at the end of summer 2021, according to NIH director Anthony Fauci. Till then, we can only prepare for the worst and hope for the best. After all, for now, we are at the very least aware of the truth behind Dr. Bruce Alwyard's statement when he said, "*This is a disease that is in the cases and their close contacts. It's not a hidden enemy lurking behind bushes.*"



To top it all off, this was definitely a proud moment for all Liverpool fans and marked a fantastic start to the Premier League season.



Influenza A: The Virus Slowly Ravaging Malaysia

The Influenza A (H1N1) outbreak has spread throughout the country, with schools forced to close and parents scrambling to vaccinate their children to prevent this disease from infecting them. The first few cases were recorded in December of 2019, and the flu has spread to many states in Malaysia, affecting citizens by the thousands. The Government, however, quickly assured the citizens of Malaysia that the situation was under control as they worked around the clock to ensure sufficient vaccines were being made available to medical facilities to curb the spread of Influenza A. According to officials, "The flu virus is officially designated by the WHO as Influenza A (H1N1), following a name change from swine flu to avoid suggestions that eating pork products carried a risk of infection, and is referred as such by Malaysia's Health Minister. Another one of our trusted sources say, "The 2009 flu outbreak in Malaysia is part of a larger flu pandemic involving a new type of influenza A virus subtype H1N1 (A (H1N1)) virus. The first death related to the A(H1N1) virus was reported

on 23rd July 2009 and so far, there have been 78 deaths reported."

Lately, there has been a string of forwarded messages on social media warning of the rise in influenza cases in the country. The Ministry had reassuringly said previously that as a tropical country, Malaysia records influenza infections throughout the year, but at a very low rate. The ministry still advises citizens to be cautious, and to take preventive measures at all times, with health and hygiene being practised more by Malaysia in order to fight this virus.


our exams, but here are a few main steps most of us students go through in preparation for exams:
