There were 67 uniquely talented students in school when I first joined elc in 1993 and it soon proved to be my home away from home. We spent a large portion of our time either at school, doing school work or thinking about and doing school work. It was an exciting period in our life as elc was still a very new school and growing rapidly in reputation and size. This meant many opportunities to get involved in the day to day running of the school and making sure that the systems in place could cope with the demands placed on it.

I have surreal memories of the school canteen when we were located in a shop-lot in TTDI. It bore no resemblance to the usual school canteens. One corner of a fairly large room with a few shelves and a high table placed in front of it, served as the canteen. There were a few chairs lined along the walls and a table tennis table right in the middle of the room. The breaks saw the students furiously rushing downstairs to the canteen to either engage in a game of table tennis or be one of the voluble cheerers.

Jrom 1990 to 1995, I started my journey with elc as the only Malay teacher for the Primary and Secondary School in Taman Tun. Mr. Rajan was one of my Form 5 students then. I left elc but returned in 2004 and stayed till 2018.

What a great place to belong to, to be a part of the elc family. I remember whenever I was on duty or walk around campus, I felt so proud to see the relationship students have with each other – it really made me feel that we are a family.

So much treasured memories were created there! The one I am the fondest of was the

extra classes before school, at break and after school even during the 'summer' holiday or term breaks. May be those of you who were forced to attend hated it but those were the moments that I got closer to you and understood you better. Then you returned to me, with bright faces, later to tell me you got a B instead of the expected F or an A instead of the expected D. Beyond the achievement of the best grade possible, I would not have been able to do my job to the best of my ability without the support and co-operation from you, the students and your parents.

When I came back to elc in 2004, I was amazed to find that all the students did in the Malay class was translate. In a way, it did make sense because the exam we took then was a pure translation paper. But you cannot learn any language properly only by translating. With the guidance and support of so many people at the school like Mrs Kaloo, I was able to lay the foundation of teaching Malay as a second language at elc. It has not been easy in this transition and by the time I left elc in 2018 the Malay syllabus evolved to more than just translation skills. After so many year of teaching Malay, I find myself still teaching now but teaching English to all students in a village school, from infants to college level. Can you imagine that?
